   God's justification of the wicked is conditional. (compare Pr 17:15)
      Justification requires sincere repentance from sin. (Lk 13:1-5, Lk 24:44-47, Ac 2:36-38)
      Justification requires forgiveness from sin through a thankful faith in Jesus as
          Saviour. (Jn 14:6, Ac 4:12, 1Jn 5:12)
      Justification requires freedom from sin through a trusting faith in Jesus as Lord. (Jn
          8:34-36, Ro 6:1-6, 1Pe 2:24,25, 1Jn 2:1-6)
   Faith is counted for righteousness.
      This is a spiritual accounting transaction, recorded in a spiritual accounting book.
          (Rev 20:11-15)
      The payment was made by Christ, with His blood, unto death. (Ac 20:28, 1Co 6:20,
          1Co 15:3, Gal 4:4,5)
          Note on Gal 4:5: Redeem - "To purchase back; to ransom" (Webster's Dictionary
             1828)
6. Impute - "to set to the account of" (Webster's Dictionary 1828)
   Genuine faith in Jesus is evidenced by actions. (Ro 2:13, Jas 2:19-24)
      Actions are the fruit, rather than the cause, of justification. (Ro 3:20,28)
7. The penalty (charge) for sin is death. (Ro 6:23)
   Out of love, Jesus died (paid) in our place. (Jn 3:16)
   Since our sin debt was covered by Jesus, we receive forgivness. (Ro 8:1,33,34)
   The natural response for such amazing grace is love. (compare Lk 7:41-43)
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8. Through Jesus, our sins are blotted out of the record books. (Isa 43:25)

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9,10. Righteousness is not imputed because of any external attribute. (compare Gal 5:6,

   Those who believe in Jesus belong to the same spiritual family (Spiritual Israel). (Ro
      2:28,29)
12,13. The spiritual descendents of Abraham (Spiritual Israel) are related through faith in
   Jesus. (Ro 9:6-8, Gal 6:14-16, Eph 2:11-13,19)
14. Works of the law do not make anyone a spiritual child (heir) of God.
   Rather, works of the law are a natural expression (fruit) of being born again through
      faith in Jesus.
15. The law defines and reveals sin. (1Jn 3:4)
   Because it reveals sin, the law condemns and convicts sinners.
16. It is only through faith in Jesus that we become spiritual children of God. (Jn 1:12)
   Since Abraham is referred to as the father of all who believe, true (spiritual) Israel
